

#### When did you first start blacksmithing?

The first bit of 'blacksmithing' I ever did was put the fire poker in the fireplace and wait for it to get red hot then hit it with logs, there's a few scorch marks on the kitchen floorboards but I've got no idea how they happened! But the first real blacksmithing I ever did was when Dad and I made an anvil out of a piece of train track and I 'borrowed' my sister's hair dryer and got a piece of pipe and blew air into the fire pit.

#### Who has helped and inspired you along the way?

John Madigan (who visited our school when I was in primary school) Otis Lanyon has given me plenty of tips, both of my grandfathers Alan Gould and Bill Twigg have encouraged me and taught me that I need to be efficient. I've also done a blacksmithing course at Waterside Metal Art Studio, which I would highly recommend to anyone who is interested in blacksmithing.

#### What equipment do you have?

I use my great-grandfather's anvil (Joe Gould from Woosang) and tongs that I've been gifted and bought

from clearing sales and specialist stores. I also have a water-cooled side-blast forge that I made myself, but it's not the first forge I've made. I had few other

forges beforehand, all under-blast farrier style, but I've found them not as good as my current one.

# What are some of the things you have made that you are most proud of?

The gate that I made for VCE Art this year, it took a lot of planning and a lot of time.

#### What do you most enjoy about blacksmithing?

I dunno really, I s'pose it's just the ability to take something as hard and commonly used as steel and take it to a state where it's like working with clay and transforming it into something else.

#### Where do you see it taking you in the future? I've just launched an Instagram page called goanna\_forge where I am showcasing some of the things I've been making and have for sale. I'm also

open for making pieces for the general public.

Nominations are now open for the 2021 Australia Day awards.

Council is receiving nominations for the Citizen of the Year, Young Citizen of the Year, Community Services and Community Group/Event of the Year awards.

Mayor Cheryl McKinnon encouraged community members to consider putting forward an Australia Day award nomination.


"The Australia Day awards celebrate the achievements and contributions made by outstanding members of our community," Cr McKinnon said.

"I urge our residents to consider nominating people and community groups who continue to contribute so much to our Shire and in recognition of their achievements."

The awards' criteria includes contribution towards values such as a fair go, concern for the environment, shared prosperity, participation in sport, cultural diversity, importance of strong community values and support systems.

Nominations are also open for the Community Service Awards. These awards recognise the outstanding contribution to the local community during the year or noteworthy service to the community over a number of years. An award is given for each ward (Boort, Inglewood, Tarnagulla, Terrick and Wedderburn).

Cr McKinnon said that Council would again hold competitions as part of its Australia Day celebrations for 2021.



"This includes a <u>literature competition</u> for Prep through to Year 12 around the topic **The Five Rings** and a <u>colouring competition</u> for Prep to Grade 2 on the topic **The Olympics.** 

"There will also be a <u>photographic competition</u> featuring Junior, Senior and Open categories. The topic is **Sports Action**," Cr McKinnon added.

*The competitions are free to enter. Competition entries close at 4pm Friday, 30 October 2020.* Nominations for the Australia Day awards close Friday, 30 October 2020.

#### Jobs skills package

The Federal Government has established the JobTrainer fund which will provide access to free or low cost vocational education and training in areas of defined need.

The fund will provide additional training places to help school leavers and job seekers access preapprenticeships, short courses and full qualifications to develop new skills and create pathways to more qualifications.

The apprenticeship wage incentive scheme has also been expanded to support both the apprentices and the small and medium sized businesses that employ them.

The JobTrainer package is a vital part of the national recovery efforts from COVID-19 by keeping apprentices in jobs and ensuring that businesses are able to get the skilled workers they need.

#### **Community connector**

As mentioned in the previous Mayoral Column, physical distancing, stay at home restrictions and work-related isolation have led to feelings of loneliness and disconnection in the community.

In response, the Victorian Government has established the COVID-19 Community Activation and Social Isolation (CASI) initiative to help people maintain and build social connections in their local communities.

An important element of the initiative is a community connector who liaises with the people who contact the hotline seeking assistance. The connector links people to local support and service agencies or groups, depending on their need. In Loddon Shire, the community connector work is being undertaken by the Bendigo Loddon Primary Care Partnership.

If you are distressed and needing someone to turn to, a friendly listening ear and caring voice, to link you into local supports or give vital information, then call the coronavirus hotline on 1800 675 398.

#### Loddon Mallee Renewable Energy Art Exhibition

Ten artworks from last year's Loddon Mallee Renewable Energy Art Exhibition are currently on show at the Inglewood Town Hall until the end of August.

In 2019, emerging and established artists from across the region submitted works to the theme, 'Our renewable energy future' in a range of mediums in



response to an invitation from the Department of Environment Land Water and Planning (DELWP).

The aim of the initiative is to provide an opportunity for artists and their communities to understand renewable energy through creative expression and to imagine a future that can help tackle climate change.

It is hoped that people will be inspired by the art and take the time to reflect and engage in discussions with family, friends and peers about renewable energy.

The exhibition will be open from 9am to 4.30pm, Monday to Thursday. Appropriate hygiene, physical distancing and contact tracing protocols will apply.

#### Farm Safety Week



National Farm Safety Week 2020, focused on educational programs to help make farms safer, especially for children.

Children in Victoria's outer regional areas aged younger than 15 are four times more likely to die due to injury than children in major cities. Drowning is the leading cause of death of children on farms.

Two programs took place in Victoria to target primary and secondary school students to increase awareness of known injury hazards such as dams, farm equipment and off-road motorbike use.

Teaching children about farms as workplaces is a vital part of changing attitudes, with information showing children influence the decisions their

parents make, in turn improving farm safety for the whole family.

#### Stay connected

On the subject of being connected, the Victorian Government is offering grants for community organisations, incorporated not-for-profit and industry groups through the 'Let's Stay Connected Fund'.

The fund offers eligible groups between \$5,000 and \$200,000 to support innovative, community-based initiatives that build connection, reduce feelings of loneliness and isolation and can also be implemented quickly, in order to provide much-needed support across the state.

The funds could help groups adapt the way they deliver programs or events, improve their digital skills or help develop new ways for people to volunteer while maintaining physical distancing.

The funds will boost communities and support them to develop new ideas to stay connected, highlighting the link between social connection and community wellbeing.

Applications for the Let's Stay Connected Fund are open until 31 August and applicants are encouraged to apply as early as possible at www.djpr.vic.gov.au/ lets-stay-connected.

#### Small business financial counselling

The Rural Financial Counselling Service is offered to eligible small businesses or those looking to start a small business in North West Victoria.

The free service is a confidential and independent program that aims to provide businesses with the tools to make informed financial and business decisions. The counsellors can provide advice on such things as: record keeping practices, debt management, employer obligations, taxation, lending institutions and support services.

Since 1984 Rural Financial Counselling Services has assisted farmers and small business owners to understand their business results and position and have helped with planning and developing business options.

On Tuesday 4 August 7pm, Loddon Shire Council hosted a virtual information session with Rural Financial Counselling Services for Loddon Shire businesses who wanted to know more about what assistance the service can give to their business.

This session was for one hour and aimed to help business owners work on their business not in their business.

#### **Stage 3 restrictions**



Regional Victoria returned to Stage 3 restrictions for six weeks. This means that there are now only four reasons to leave your home: shopping for food and essential items, care and caregiving, to exercise, and work and study (if you can't do it at home).

These restrictions also mean that you can't have visitors to your home, and schools have returned to remote learning.

Businesses will also return to Stage 3 restrictions – this includes the closing of pubs, while cafes and restaurants are take-away only.

Unfortunately these restrictions also mean the closure of our parks, playgrounds and outdoor gym equipment.

Council's Wedderburn and Serpentine customer service offices continue to remain closed to the public. However, you can call our customer service on 5494 1200, or email <u>loddon@loddon.vic.gov.au</u>

All Goldfields Libraries branches and agencies have closed and are expected to remain closed until at least Sunday, 13 September (in line with the Victorian Government's anticipated easing of Stage 3 restrictions).

The Goldfields Library teams will still be hosting online programs and events – including Storytimes (via Zoom, YouTube and Facebook).

You can also enjoy a range of online library services, such as eBooks, audiobooks, digital magazines and newspapers, family history and learning at home resources, movies and television, children's activities and wellbeing activities.

As we saw the last time we faced these restrictions, I am sure our community will once again work together and help each other out during this time.

#### **Rates and COVID-19 Hardship Policy**

With the distribution of rate notices from late last week, I just wanted to remind our community that Council has implemented a COVID-19 Hardship Policy. This policy helps ratepayers experiencing difficulty in meeting rate payment deadlines – whether you pay your rates by instalment or in full.

For people suffering financial hardship, Council can help by discussing payment plans for rates and charges that are tailored to suit a ratepayer's individual needs. Deferments of rate payments for a short time can also be negotiated.

If you're paying your rates by instalment, the first instalment is due on 30 September 2020. If you choose to pay your rates in full, the payment is due on 15 February 2021.

You can also now receive your rates notices electronically via EzyBill. This safe, securely hosted and easy-to-use system lets you receive future rate notices electronically to your email address. You will just need a copy of your latest rate notice to register.

### Funding for Little Lake Boort Footpath

#### Project

In some positive news, the Victorian Government recently announced



funding of \$50,000 to complete the Little Lake Boort foreshore footpath project, through its *Building Works* package.

Healthy Heart of Victoria has also provided \$5,000 in funding towards the project and Council \$5,000 inkind support.

The footpath, to be constructed at the northern end of the lake, will allow community members to walk,

run or ride around the lake without needing to cross the main road, providing an uninterrupted footpath and improved safety.

The funding for the footpath is very much welcomed. According to Council's Active Living Census 2019, Little Lake Boort was identified as the number one recreation facility used throughout the Loddon Shire.

Completion of the footpath will not only improve this well-loved facility, but will have a positive impact on the community, including by encouraging physical activity.

The project was originally identified through the Healthy Heart of Victoria and the Boort community, with Boort Tourism Development Committee providing \$7,000 in seed funding to establish parkrun events (once easing of COVID-19 restrictions permit this). Parkruns are free, weekly community events held around the world.

The works are expected to be completed by the end of this year.

#### Victorian Country Market e-commerce initiative

Loddon Valley producers are encouraged to join the Victorian Country Market (VCM) – an e-commerce initiative that promotes the best that regional Victoria has to offer.

The VCM is a unique and purpose-built site for regional vendors and producers to continue to showcase their quality products to Victorians. It also provides a way for the public to continue to support our farmers, growers, makers and traders during these uncertain times.

The VCM is not intended to replace any current ecommerce ventures or existing markets/networks. Instead the market aims to enhance and extend them – similar to regular farmers markets, trade show or field day would.

The market is free to join for the first year of operation, and includes free delivery within Victoria until the end of August.

#### **Projects update**

A number of projects are currently underway in our Shire – including drainage works in Kiniry Street at Boort.

The works include underground stormwater drainage, new footpath as well as kerb and channel. The works are anticipated to be completed towards the end of September.

Initial preparation work for the replacement of Sloan's

Road Bridge over Bullabul Creek south west of Bridgewater is underway. All components for the new concrete bridge have been cast, with works to start soon on dismantling the old bridge for its replacement. The project is expected to be completed by the end of October.

Safety upgrade works on the Old Inglewood reservoir are also progressing, with works anticipated to be finished by the end of the year.

Please bear in mind that due to the COVID-19 pandemic, including the re-introduction of Stage 3 restrictions, there may be an impact on these projects' expected date of completion.

## World War II Veteran prepared to mark significant day in history

The 94-year-old continues to run cattle on his 400ha property at Canary Island, near Boort, where his father and grandfather farmed before him. But he says it took him a while to settle back into farming life after he returned from WWII.

THE bright red poppy pinned to Kel Jeffery's chest stands out against the golden landscape he has been part of almost his whole life. Kel enlisted into the RAAF and served overseas in England and Scotland, mainly training pilots.

"I was very unsettled," he said. "You're with a lot of people when you're away ... then you come home to a totally different life."

At 11am on Sunday [11/11/2018], Kel and people from all over Australia and the world will mark a significant day in history: the centenary of the end of WWI.

While Anzac Day is a bigger event for Boort RSL, Kel says, he is expecting a strong turnout to the Sunday ceremony, where he has the "little job" of raising the flag.

On both of those dates, he says there is a lot to reflect on.

"We're very proud of what we achieved on Anzac Day, or tried to achieve — some of our results weren't perfect were they?" he said.

"It's to remind us of the fact that there are no winners, are there? Some lose more than others, that's about what it boils down to.

"It's good to have the young ones involved and to teach them a little bit about what is going on, more than I ever knew."

Kel buys cattle to fatten on his farm. He has about 80, but is planning to add to that number.



# Child and Young Adult Census in Buloke and Loddon Shires

#### 8 July 2020

The North Central LLEN is about to facilitate the trialling of a new early life monitoring system designed to follow the social and emotional development of children and young people to better understand how young Australians think and feel about their lives.

The project will focus from early childhood (birth to 3 years), into middle childhood (9 and 12 years), adolescence (15 and 18 years) and young adult life (18 to 21 years) and will be held across the Buloke and Loddon Shires, with the Young Adult Census as the first stage.

According to North Central LLEN Executive Officer Jane Hosking, this is the first time feasibility of a study of this magnitude has been undertaken in Australia, and the information will help inform the way we support all children and young people in the future.

"We know mental health and behaviour problems are among the most debilitating and costly health problems facing families, communities and countries globally."

"Most have their origins in the very earlier experiences of childhood and adolescence, with almost all problems peaking in adulthood (18-24 years)," said Ms Hosking. "Despite this we currently have no systematic way of identifying young people at risk and informing government where supports are most urgently needed in the early life course."

"This method holds considerable promise for strengthening community-based approaches to promoting mental health, and preventing mental disorder, within and across generations, she said.

Ms Hosking says the project builds on decades of longitudinal research that has repeatedly shown that every age and stage of development matters in the trajectories that children and young people take.

"A life course approach to monitoring and supporting the social and emotional growth of children and young people is essential for strengthening populations to successful psychosocial adjustment across the entire life course," she said.

Participation is confidential and the first stage involves young people between the ages of 18 and 21 who have left school completing a short survey (less than 10 minutes) which can be found at <u>redcap.link/youngadult</u>.

The project is being led by the Victorian Department of Education and Training (DET) as an extension of the Australian Early Development Census in Victoria, in collaboration with Centre for Social and Early Emotional Development at Deakin University, the Human Early Learning Partnership (University of British Columbia, Canada), and the Murdoch Children's Research Institute (Royal Children's Hospital Melbourne).

It is being funded by the National Health and Medical Research Council, the Victorian Department of Education and Training, and the Ian Potter Foundation.
