#### Reflections on Netball in Boort

I would like to congratulate the Boort Netball Club and Boort Park for the two great netball courts and facilities that they have now. When I first saw the new courts I thought wouldn't it be lovely to play on such great surfaces and to be able to use the facilities that they have. Why? Basketball as it was known as in the 1950's commenced playing competition with the football as noted in the Recorder on the 11<sup>th</sup> April 1953 "the girl's basketball association is something new in this league and should lend colour to the football fixtures. Games will be played adjacent to football arenas and should be watched with interest".

It was a much different game to the one played today in that the court was divided into more areas and players had less room to move in. The centre's shall face one another standing each end of the centre line and they are only allowed in the centre third. When the goaler received the ball, the defence stood beside her and there were no rebounds. If the goaler missed the defence then took a throw in from the baseline. There were severe penalties if players called out during the game so many types of sign language were invented!

The players of today have many luxuries compared to the 50's & 60's. The courts were either dirt or grass and the lines were lime and as you could imagine in wet conditions, the girls were nearly as muddy as the footballers. The change rooms were the local toilet, maybe a shed or the car and no showers or running water to wash off the mud.

In Boort the basketball court was at the north end of the footy oval where the hockey is now, with no lights we used the head lights of cars to get in a bit more training, but they did not last for long. When wet there were 14 very muddy girls and 1 very wet Umpire. Sometimes a kind supporter would offer to take us to their house for a shower.

The next step in Boort was when the basketball court was moved in front of the big wooden grandstand, still dirt, but we had the luxury of a room under the north end of the grandstand as a change room. More improvements came along with the sealing of a court in the present area and lighting - no more headlights needed. How the price of things has changed. At the Annual meeting 1960 subscription fees were set at 12/- (\$1.20) for adults, 5/- (50 cents) for school children and 2/- (20 cents) for insurance.

It was in the 60's that new rules came in with different court markings and playing areas for players. These court markings are the same as today and the gradual change towards today's style of play. With the new regulations came the radical method of using extra players with the Coach now able to give these players a run on the court without waiting for that "dreaded" injury to occur.

The players, coaches and volunteers have the wonderful luxury of lovely change rooms, hot showers and fantastic playing and coaching conditions, congratulations.

We understand the current trend towards electronic banking, but there is ALWAYS going to be the need for face-to-face banking in our community. The CBA should remember that they are in a service industry and the customer should be treated as a priority.



# Eulogy for Clara Stringer 3 January 1915 – 16 March 2017

Today we celebrate the life of an amazing lady, Clara Stringer or as she was known to so many "Grandma Stringer". Small in stature but such an integral part of our lives and community.

Storytelling was a family trait that Clara carried on so well. She had a turn of phrase, a saying or quip for each situation along with that sparkle in her eye. It is impossible to share all these in a eulogy but her ability to make each person here feel special, will encourage you to share your memories and stories together later, the story does not end here.

Clara was born to Charles and Florence Maynard on the third of January 1915 in Boort at the hospital then situated in Lake View St. She was the youngest sister of Grace, Frank, Stephen, Arthur, Ray and Reta. The Maynards moved from three miles out into the township of Mysia when Clara was three years old. She attended the Mysia school from age four and a half to when she was thirteen years old.

While Clara was a child her eldest sister Grace was working away from home and they did not see a lot of her. Grace had very long black hair, one day Clara asked her, "How come your hair is black?" Grace answered, "Because I use a black comb." Clara and Reta spent ages looking for a black comb. It didn't work!

Sometimes in school holidays she would travel on the train up to Quambatook and Cannie with her mother, Ray and Reta to stay with her father and Frank who each worked horse teams and wagons carting wheat to the nearest railway stations. They camped in a "cabin on wheels" and the men in tents near the big dam. She loved these times when they would go on the loads, sometimes help sew the tops of the wheat bags or lead the horse to put the bags onto the wagon.

Other school holidays were spent in Yando with her mother's twin sister, Fanny Haw or her grandparents, Margaret and John McDonald. The McDonalds had a productive orchard and one Christmas time Clara had kept her eye on a peach that was ripening each day. She asked a number of times if she could pick it but was always told, "No, it isn't ready yet". On Christmas morning there it was tucked into her stocking!

In 1929 she went to work babysitting for Helen and Jack Stringer for two or three days a week for a start then left school and continued working. She was fourteen then and used to walk about two miles every morning, sometimes getting a ride home in the evening otherwise walking back. It was suggested she could have a bike but her father insisted that, "The exercise's good for her."

Clara worked in a number of different homes and farms around Mysia and Fernihurst mostly minding children. As her father and brothers were away working a lot she came home to keep her mother company and started working for Mrs Kirkham at the Farmers Arms Hotel, which was close and handy. Amongst other things one of her jobs was on a Saturday morning, to get down on her hands and knees to wash and polish the long passage that went the full length of the hotel, it had coconut matting down the middle but a foot or more of lino each side to be kept clean and shiny. It always looked great but a bit disheartening on Sunday morning after the local football teams and their supporters had traipsed up and down the passage on Saturday to use the billiard room as a change room. They often played football in the wet and mud. Sunday morning the billiard table too would need to be cleaned, but as the table was full-sized, and Clara was only small, she needed to take her shoes off, and climb onto the table to sweep it with a straw broom.

Clara was very shy and was glad that she was not old enough to work in the bar. It was very busy as there were boarders and the hotel served lunch and dinner. Reta and Thelma Carter would come and give a hand and Fred helped with the dishes (only to court Clara).

When Fred and Clara married on 6 February 1935, they had practically nothing but each other, a capacity for hard work, and determination. They leased land and farmed at Mysia, Fred also did a lot of contract carting. Lorraine, Phyl, Don, Gwen, Peter, Joy and Rod were all born while they were living in Mysia. Wendy was born after the family moved to Boort.

While still working the Mysia properties Fred bought ground at Yando in 1952 and they moved into the house at 59 Lake View St, Boort. In 1961 Fred and Clara moved out to "Loddon Lea" at Yando, and then closer to town in 1977 when McKenzies was purchased. Clara was always involved with the farm and the work entailed with it, this was a real and continuous partnership.

Family has always taken first priority in her life, her hospitality and care for them and their friends is legendary. Clara's family is widespread and diverse, but at Grandma's house they were all one, it was always a place to belong, relax and be together. Christmas at the Shearing Shed shared with five generations highlights this. Food, greetings, hugs, laughter, quiet moments, the eagerly awaited visit of Santa on the back of the ute, a time to catch up, to reminisce, to anticipate the year to come, to play cricket, and plan the Boxing Day Yabby Races. Each year there is a Cricket match that is taken extremely seriously.

Since 1990 a magnificent trophy has been presented to the winner of the "Person of the Match" carefully chosen by a "select" committee. Over the years, there has been all sorts of weather: very cold, very hot, very wet, a dust storm, and one year when It was too wet to play cricket – because the paddock was covered with a sheet of water, the trophy was awarded to Grandma Stringer, for keeping the pitch well-watered.

Animals were always a part of her life, the bullock teams of Charlie and Frank and then their horse teams along with the saddle horses, and Fred's horses too. Dogs, tortoises, lizards, chooks, rabbits there always seemed to be pets. From a letter she wrote in 1993, "I had better close now and go down for the mail. Rex, Belle (the two dogs) and the cats are waiting near the gate." The magpie that came for any scraps she had would also accompany them flying ahead to the next fence post, wait for her to catch up and then fly on ahead.

Clara lived at the farm six kilometres out the Yando Road until she was almost 99. Each evening she loved to sit out on the front verandah with her dog, Joker watching the light changing across the paddocks, keeping an eye on who was going past and whether they were heading to Boort or going home, and watching with interest the birds coming in to drink at her bird bath – white-eared honeyeaters, noisy miners, magpies, grey-crowned babblers, and rosellas were the most frequent.

Out in the paddock the galahs would roost in the box trees, she said they were like children as they settled down. First they would be making a racket and just when you think they have all gone to bed and settled one would start again and that would set off all the rest. It only takes one!

Clara was blessed to die peacefully and pain-free, her daily routine only halted by death. To the last she was thanking the staff at Loddon Place for anything they did for her, and caring for the other residents grateful for the care and friendship they offered her. She was still showing interest in all the family and what was happening in the wider community. On the Sunday before she died she was at the farm for afternoon tea with the family, or those who were around, as she was each Saturday and Sunday. There were twenty-two there, the large number no reason for her to be excused from doing the drying up.

Clara was 102, but our grief is very strong, somehow we weren't quite ready for her to not be here. None of us have known a time when Clara was not here. We all express this grief in our own personal way. One of her grandsons posted on Facebook late last Thursday night: "Sitting around drinking Milo with sugar in it, and it tastes like home and safety and love unconditional. Vale Grandma Stringer, our hero".

When we would leave Clara or finish a conversation on the phone, we would always say "Love you"; Clara almost always replied, "I love you too, I love you all." Words that highlighted her inclusiveness and her bigness of heart. Love made her resilient, love shaped her world and her family, love embraced the extras that were always at her home and love fed her witty sense of humour. Unconditional love. Words for us to cherish and hold on to. "I love you all".
